Shombugonji, BANGLADESH Health Comes First

A Health Care and Hygiene Awareness Program was organized at Sr Euphrasie's Dispensary for the local community. A total of 57 participants, including women, men, and children, attended the program.

A professional nurse delivered an informative session on adolescent health, pre-birth care, maternal well-being, newborn care, and the important role of husbands in supporting mothers during pregnancy and after childbirth. Some other topics were personal hygiene, sanitation, and the importance of maintaining a clean and healthy lifestyle. Emphasis was made on child nutrition, quality education, and the effective use of the newly established dispensary. The community was encouraged to make use of the dispensary's services and this reaffirmed the sisters' commitment to serving the poor and vulnerable through healthcare, education, home visits, and compassionate care.

Following the awareness sessions, participants received basic health services, including blood pressure, blood sugar, and weight checks. Medicines were also distributed according to individual needs.

The participants expressed sincere gratitude for the health education, medical assistance, and the compassionate service provided. The program successfully promoted greater awareness of preventive healthcare and encouraged the community to adopt healthier lifestyles.
